FRDS LOSE TRACK OF 3,000 DATA CENTERS

Do you know about the Federal Datacenter closure program? Your government in action thought they had identified 3,000 facilities that fall under this closure consolidation program.

But as reported in the Federal Times, David Powner, Director of Information Technology Management at the Government Accountability Office, told Congress that a recent estimate of the number of datacenters subject to closure had reached 6,000, which included 3,000 that had not previously been counted. He also said that after three years there were still no

good, hard numbers on the total number of datacenters in use or where they were located.

This highlights the difference between government and private business. Losing track of entire datacenters, large or small, is something that does not happen in private business. But in government, multiple agencies run their own centers with little or no oversight or give authority or responsibility to any central entity that can be held responsible to keep track.

The original goal was to shut down 800 of the 2.100 datacenters that the government thought they had three years ago. Now, the OMB has decided that the target is 40% of the datacenters. The OMB's new direction now specifies that only non-core datacenters will be shut down. This might be a useful goal if the OMB had defined the term non-core. But they didn't and thus, the mandate cannot be applied equally. Each government department is free to decide what is non-core for them.

Those who work in government are used to dealing with vague mandates that fail reality. With a mandate handed down from the OMB without details or significant investigation into what implementation would actually require, the odds of this program ending well is very small.

But this should be good news for those bothered by the news of the federal government gathering telephone numbers and emails. If the government can't even keep track of how many data centers they have or give clear direction on which to close, what chance is there the government can keep track of and make use of the telephone and email data?

SAME-SEX MARRIAGE: YES OR NO?

With a ruling by the Supreme Court on Proposition 8 and the Defense Of Marriage Act expected in the next few days, it is worth asking the question as to whether same-sex marriage (SSM) should be legalized as a matter of policy. The question being asked here isn't whether same-sex marriage is constitutionally required, or whether the matter should be left to the individual states, but rather whether SSM is a good idea on its own merits.

One of the primary arguments for SSM is that it is only fair that same-sex couples should have the same rights straight couples. As strong as this argument is (and it is a strong argument), it attempts to bring the concept of fairness into a realm from which it had, up until a few years ago, been excluded. Fairness and justice, as quasi religious/ philosophical concepts, can be brought into certain philosophical realms or they can be left out. But the decision whether or not to bring SSM into those realms is a religious/philosophical one nonetheless. So the primary argument for SSM depends on whether or not one accepts the guasi-religious underpinnings of the decision to bring the concept of fairness into the question of SSM.

Another argument for SSM is that marriage is between two people and who cares what same-sex couples do, as long as they are not hurting anyone. Again, this is a very strong argument in favor of SSM. However, it does rest on a couple of assertions; one of which is false and one of which may or may not be true. Page 3

SAME-SEX MARRIAGE

The first (false) assertion is that civil marriage is between two people. It isn't. Civil marriage involves three entities: the two individuals AND the community (as represented by the state). Those who argue that the state has no moral right to deny marriage benefits to SSM couples are in effect saying that the community has no moral right to decide which behaviors it will approve of and which it will not.

The second assertion is that SSM is not hurting anyone. While this appears to be superficially true (nobody appears to have dropped dead as a result of SSM having been approved in certain states), and may in fact eventually be proved correct, the fact is that SSM changes a societal institution and nobody can really say for sure how this will play out in 40, 50, or 60 years.

This is not to say that SSM will cause a whole host of social problems. We simply don't know what, if anything, it will do. It may have no impact, a positive impact, or a negative impact. At this time, anyone claiming to know what the impact will be is simply guessing. So the real question is this: given that we know that traditional marriage works well as a societal institution based on centuries & millennia of experience and we don't yet know what long-term social consequences will result from SSM, do we want to take the risk of approving SSM? For some, the answer may yes. For myself, I tend to be a risk-averse person. Consequently, I would vote no.
